#### **Editorial**

Quite a busy month before the summer Parliament recess so here is a summary of the key points of note:

2 July saw the final report issued from the review into the North Hyde Substation outage which caused Heathrow to shut down last March. A 'catastrophic failure on one of the transformer's high voltage bushings' was given as the likely cause. The airport is now considering taking legal action against National Grid as it was a 'known fault' at the electrical substation. Heathrow chief executive Thomas Woldbye also admitted that it was "frustrating" that he had slept through numerous calls during the substation fire that led to the airport's closure.

Still with Heathrow, this month it presented its plans for the next 5-year period to the CAA saying mini expansion could add 10 million passengers by 2031 as long as it can increase airline charges. This will not please the airlines who already believe Heathrow is one of the most expensive airports in the world and they would like the regulator to decrease charges instead. A separate proposal for long-term capacity expansion, principally from the addition of a third runway, was be submitted to the UK Government on 30th July, and if approved could be operational by 2035. It is though alternative proposals for expanding Heathrow were also submitted by third parties.

The Transport Secretary has told air passengers to assume the 100ml limit on liquids in hand luggage remains in place despite some airports acquiring new scanners which allows bottles of up to two litres to be taken on board planes. Many airports around the UK are at different stages of putting the technology in place that would mean the near 20-year-old rule on liquids could be relaxed.

This month (13<sup>th</sup>) saw a small plane crash at London Southend Airport. Big (such as the crash in India last month) or small, it is a reminder of the constant need for vigilance about safety, in what remains a dangerous industry when failures (mechanical, procedural or human) happen.

In other news, Newcastle Airport published its 15-year masterplan for consultation as it prepares for 9 million passengers by 2040. This will mean, amongst other changes, extending the runway and the terminal plus adding more aircraft stands.

On the 16 July, the world's first piloted airport-to-airport flight using a full-scale, winged tilt-rotor electric vertical take-off and landing (eVTOL) aircraft designed for commercial use, was completed when it flew from Cotswold Airport to RAF Fairford. This showcases the potential of electric aviation marking a significant step toward sustainable, innovative air travel.

On 23 July, Leeds Bradford Airport lost its appeal for nighttime flights. The airport is currently 'reviewing the outcomes' of its failed applications whilst campaigners against the proposals, are, celebrating.

Lots of aviation-related Parliamentary questions this month despite it being a 'short' month as Parliament headed into its recess for the summer break. There are far too many to list here so please take the opportunity to review the ones included in our Parliamentary Questions section of the Bulletin. Of particular interest are those asking the Transport Secretary what her planned timetable is for the revision of the National Policy Statement on airport expansion. The Government has stated that it supports airport expansion but that it must be delivered in line with the UK's legal, climate and environmental obligations. Also of note are questions relating to Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) and very importantly, regional connectivity such as Q. No. 68669 asked by Ben Maguire (North Cornwall) on 16 July 2025.

This month saw some changes within the DfT's Noise Policy team. The team is moving to a new division which brings together all environmental issues including decarbonisation and air quality. This division is led by Joe Delafield, although day-to-day contact on noise policy will remain with Tim May, Head of Noise Policy, and Adrian Eaton who has replaced Ian Greene as Noise Policy Lead.

Finally, on 30<sup>th</sup>, we saw flights in and out of major UK airports grounded over radar issues, causing travel chaos across the country. Heathrow, Gatwick, Luton, Stansted, Luton and Birmingham were all affected as a result of a technical issue at NATS Swanwick air traffic control centre. Shades of nearly two years ago, when more than 700,000 passengers suffered disruption when flights were grounded at UK airports by a similar ATC issue.

So, on that note: happy holidays to anyone setting out on theirs and best wishes with your travels!

#### Recent:

#### **EAC:** Call for evidence: Airport Expansion v. Net Zero and Environmental Targets

On 28 March the Environmental Audit Committee announced it was undertaking an inquiry on airport expansion and climate and nature targets. In this inquiry the Committee sought to:

- establish the climate and environmental targets which Ministers ought to ensure are met under its policy to support airport expansion;
- examine current projections for aviation demand, for aviation emissions and for the reduction of emissions and other negative environmental impacts, through technological developments and other means;
- ascertain what environmental and climate conditions the Government ought to establish for airport developments through the use of planning policy statements, and
- consider how Ministers should seek to maintain aviation's compliance with climate and environmental targets and what policy safeguards might be necessary to achieve this.

The call for evidence giving more information about this inquiry can be read <a href="here">here</a> and was open until 24 April 2025.

#### **Civil Aviation Regulatory Safety Framework**

On 20 June 2025, the DfT launched a consultation to gather views from stakeholders on the <u>aviation safety regulatory framework</u> and potential options for reform. A wide range of stakeholders would be interested in the important issues presented in this document and the related consultation and the DfT welcomes responses from all stakeholders who are regulated under aviation safety legislation. They invited stakeholders to provide responses to the questions set out, share their views on potential future approaches to aviation safety regulation, and/or to provide views on any issue relevant to the effective operation of the UK's framework for aviation safety regulation.

#### **Parliamentary and Government News**

#### 1 July: NATS Technical Failure of August 2023: CAA Report

The CAA today published a report on the progress made in relation to the 34 recommendations that were made in the independent review's final report into the NATS technical IT failure of August 2023. See here for details.

#### 2 July - Heathrow Substation Outage: NESO Review

The Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Energy Security and Net Zero made a statement on the publication of the report from the National Energy System Operator following its review into the fire at the North Hyde substation on 20 March. NESO's review was commissioned jointly by the Energy Secretary and Ofgem in the immediate aftermath of the fire, which disrupted power supply to over 70,000 customers, including, of course, Heathrow airport, which closed operations on 21 March. #### **Transport Questions: House of Lords**

#### **Parliamentary Questions:**

Q.1. Question (63993) asked by Andrew Rosindell (Romford) on 1 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Business and Trade, what steps his Department is taking to encourage the inclusion of small and medium-sized enterprises in procurement processes related to the development and supply of sustainable aviation fuel".

A. Sarah Jones on 4 July 2025: "My Department supports SME participation in innovative sectors such as sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) through the Business Growth Service. This makes it easier for businesses to get advice and support they need and later this year, we will publish a SME Strategy Paper to promote inclusive supply chains and easier access to finance.

The SAF Mandate sets targets for SAF uptake and creates new market opportunities. To support SAF production, the Department for Transport has launched the Advanced Fuels Fund (AFF). The AFF funding is allocated through a competitive process and is available to a range of entities, including SMEs and start-ups".

Q.2. Question (63994) asked by Andrew Rosindell (Romford) on 1 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what assessment she has made of the impact of regulation on small and medium-sized enterprises involved in the development and deployment of sustainable aviation fuel; and whether she plans to simplify relevant processes".

A. Mike Kane on 4 July 2025: "I refer the hon Member to the answer I gave on 23/06/2025, to Question UIN 60297".

- Q.3. Question (65013) asked by Blake Stephenson (Mid Bedfordshire) on 4 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, if he will make an assessment of the potential merits of amending the waste hierarchy to encourage councils to assign more black bin waste to the production of sustainable aviation fuels".
- A. Mary Creagh on 8 July 2025: "I refer the hon. Member to the answer given to the hon. Member for Falkirk on 8 May 2025 to Question 49143".
- Q.4. Question (64090) asked by Kevin Hollinrake (Thirsk & Malton) on 1 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, pursuant to the Answer of 16 June 2025 to Question 57460 on Policy, what her planned timetable is for the revision of the National Policy Statement on airport expansion".

A. Mike Kane on 7 July 2025: "The government supports airport expansion and has invited proposals for a third runway at Heathrow. It expects any proposals to be brought forward by the summer and is clear that any scheme must be delivered in line with the UK's legal, climate and environmental obligations. Once proposals have been received, the government will review the Airports National Policy Statement (ANPS), which provides the basis for decision making on granting development consent for a new runway at Heathrow. The Secretary of State will determine the scope of a review of the ANPS and we cannot speculate on the scope nor the timings of the review at this stage".

Q.5. Question (65836) asked by Sarah Olney (Richmond) on 8 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether her Department has had discussions with Heathrow Airport on flights being held in a holding pattern over residents' houses between 5:30-6:00am".

A. Mike Kane on 14 July 2025: "NATS is responsible for providing air traffic services at Heathrow Airport. There are defined flight routes and procedures for aircraft landing at Heathrow but for operational and safety reasons aircraft may be held in a holding pattern prior to landing. These reasons can include the need to ensure safe separation between aircraft as well as weather conditions".

### Q.6. Question (65262) asked by Jim Shannon (Strangford) on 7 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what steps her Department is taking to support the aviation sector".

A. Mike Kane on11 July 2025: "This Government has shown that it will support the UK aviation sector by backing airport expansions that promote economic growth while meeting climate and environmental standards, as well as ending years of uncertainty by inviting proposals for a third runway at Heathrow.

We have introduced a package of measures to encourage the production and use of homegrown Sustainable Aviation Fuel, positioning the UK as a world leading destination for this new market. The new revenue certainty mechanism will provide a price guarantee for SAF producers that will boost jobs across the country. This delivers on the UK's clean energy and growth missions.

We have also recently announced the go ahead for the UK Airspace Design Service (UKADS) which will improve confidence in the delivery of airspace modernisation in the UK, fulfilling a key manifesto commitment to enable quicker, quieter and cleaner flights".

Q.7. Question (66031) asked by Kirsteen Sullivan (Bathgate & Linlithgow) on 8 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether her Department plans to take steps to prevent aviation fuel suppliers from charging compliance risk premiums to mandated volumes of sustainable aviation fuel".

A. Mike Kane on11 July 2025: "We recognise that SAF is more expensive than jet fuel. This is why the Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) Mandate has been designed to protect against excessive costs. The SAF Mandate also has a built-in review process so the Government can take action to change scheme parameters if necessary. The pricing of SAF are commercial decisions for the market though we are working to further understand interactions between the SAF Mandate and SAF pricing. We are engaging with relevant stakeholders – including airports, airlines, fuel suppliers and trade associations to do this".

Q.8. Question (HL9412) asked by Lord Jamieson on 14 July 2025: "To ask His Majesty's Government, with reference to Appendix 2, page 61, Annex 1: Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects reform, of the Planning and Infrastructure Bill: Impact assessment (published May 2025) Appendix 2, page 61, and the November 2027 target date for the updated Airports National Policy Statement, whether they anticipate that the infrastructure planning application for the Heathrow Airport expansion can be submitted before the publication and ratification of the revised Airports National Policy Statement".

A. Lord Hendy of Richmond Hill on 23 July 2025: "The Government has invited proposals for a third runway at Heathrow to be brought forward by the summer. Once proposals have

been received, the Government will review the Airports National Policy Statement in line with the requirements of the Planning Act 2008. When the ANPS has been reviewed, and depending on the outcome of the review, it will be for scheme promoters to decide when to submit a Development Consent Order application for a third runway scheme".

### Q.9. Question (67786) asked by John Milne (Horsham) on 14 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, if she will ask Gatwick Airport to publish an assessment of the potential impact of a second runway on levels of emissions other than carbon dioxide".

A. Mike Kane on14 July 2025: "The application for the Gatwick Airport Northern Runway Development Consent Order, submitted by Gatwick Airport Limited, is currently with the Secretary of State for a decision, with a statutory deadline of the 27 October 2025. The Examining Authority, in its 6-month Examination conducted last year, held several public hearings on the issues of noise and surface transport, providing Interested Parties with the opportunity to present their views. There is no mechanism within the Planning Act 2008 to conduct a public hearing at the decision stage.

The Secretary of State has consulted on several matters during the decision stage and may request further information from Gatwick Airport or Interested Parties, if she is not satisfied that there is sufficient evidence to take a decision. Interested Parties can provide further representations to the Secretary of State, which will be taken into consideration. All information regarding this application can be found on the Planning Inspectorate's website".

## Q.10. Question (67783) asked by John Milne (Horsham) on 14 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, if she will hold a consultation on the development consent order for the expansion of Gatwick Airport before deciding whether to approve it".

A. Mike Kane on17 July 2025: "The application for the Gatwick Airport Northern Runway Development Consent Order, submitted by Gatwick Airport Limited, is currently with the Secretary of State for a decision, with a statutory deadline of the 27 October 2025. The Examining Authority, in its 6-month Examination conducted last year, held several public hearings on the issues of noise and surface transport, providing Interested Parties with the opportunity to present their views. There is no mechanism within the Planning Act 2008 to conduct a public hearing at the decision stage.

The Secretary of State has consulted on several matters during the decision stage and may request further information from Gatwick Airport or Interested Parties, if she is not satisfied that there is sufficient evidence to take a decision. Interested Parties can provide further representations to the Secretary of State, which will be taken into consideration. All information regarding this application can be found on the Planning Inspectorate's website".

# Q.11. Question (67744) asked by Vikki Slade (Mid-Dorset & Nth Poole) on 14 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether she plans to impose (a) quotas and (b) no-flying times at night at (a) Bournemouth International Airport and (b) other regional airports".

A. Mike Kane on 21 July 2025: "The Government only sets noise-related restrictions at Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted airports. At all other airports, including Bournemouth,

flight restrictions are set through the planning system and not by the Government. It is the responsibility of the relevant local planning authority to conduct any necessary noise assessments and to enforce any restrictions".

Q.12. Question (67387) asked by Kevin Hollinrake (Thirsk & Malton) on 14 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether she plans to seek Parliamentary approval for the revised Airports National Policy Statement before submitting the infrastructure planning application for Heathrow Airport expansion".

A. Mike Kane on 22 July 2025: "The Government has invited proposals for a third runway at Heathrow to be brought forward by the summer. Once proposals have been received, the Government will review the Airports National Policy Statement. When conducting the review, the Secretary of State will comply with the requirements in the Planning Act 2008, including consultation, publicity and parliamentary requirements.

When the ANPS has been reviewed, and depending on the outcome of the review, it will be for scheme promoters to submit a Development Consent Order application for a third runway scheme".

Q.13. Question (68730) asked by Andrew Rosindell (Romford) on 17 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what steps she has taken to improve aviation interconnectivity between the four nations of the UK".

A. Mike Kane on 22 July 2025: "Airports serve our local communities by supporting thousands of jobs in the regions and acting as a gateway to international opportunities, alongside maintaining social and family ties and strengthening the bonds between the four nations. The Government supports connectivity across the union through our joint-funding of three Public Service Obligation (PSO) routes into London from Newquay, Dundee and Derry/Londonderry. Furthermore, the Aviation Futures Forum, which I Co-Chair, has agreed to establish a number of working groups including one on Regional Aviation. The Group will report back to the Forum in due course".

Q.14. Question (68458) asked by Sarah Olney (Richmond Park) on 16 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, with reference to Table 9.2 of her Department's report entitled Updated Appraisal Report: Airport Capacity in the South East, published in October 2017, whether it remains her Department's estimate that the net present value of a Heathrow northwest runway has a high of £3.3billion and a low of minus £2.2billion".

A. Mike Kane on 22 July 2025: "The latest published information on the net present value of a Heathrow Northwest runway is contained in the "Addendum to the Updated Appraisal Report" published June 2018 which updated the Department's estimate to a net present value of £2.9bn to minus £2.5bn in 2014 prices. Economic benefits as reported in the Updated Appraisal Report also fed into the Airports National Policy Statement (ANPS). The Department has committed to reviewing and updating the ANPS and has invited proposals for a third runway to be brought forward by the summer. Once proposals are received, the government will review the Airports National Policy Statement (ANPS) which provides the basis for decision making on granting development consent for a new runway at Heathrow".

Q.15. Question (68669) asked by Ben Maguire (North Cornwall) on 16 July 2025: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what steps his Department is taking to develop a long-term strategy for regional air connectivity that (a) reduces reliance on (i) Gatwick Airport (ii) Heathrow Airport and (iii) other major hubs and (b) supports the growth of (1) Cornwall Airport Newquay and (2) other regional airports".

A. Mike Kane on 21 July 2025: "The Department recognises how vital aviation is to maintaining connectivity between the regions of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and to the wider world. Ministers and officials at the Department meet regularly with regional airports, including Cornwall Newquay Airport, to discuss issues such as regional air connectivity.

Government supports connectivity across the union through our joint-funding of three Public Service Obligation (PSO) routes into London from Newquay, Dundee and Derry/Londonderry. The Government keeps PSO policy under review. This includes recommendations made through the Union Connectivity Review published in November 2021".
