#### 20 November 2023: 2024-25 CAA Schemes of Charges Publication:

The CAA's statutory charges FY24/25 consultation was and explains their proposals for revisions to the existing CAA Charges Schemes, due to take effect from 1 April 2024. They are welcoming comment on all aspects of the proposals, including the structure and the level of the charges. Following the consultation period, the CAA will publish a response document reflecting the consultation feedback received from industry and the Secretary of State for Transport.

# 4 December 2023: Airport Slots:

The DfT launched a consultation seeking views on the proposals for reform that will apply to slot allocation at Level 3 slot coordinated airports.

Level 3 airports in the UK are:

London Heathrow; London Gatwick; London City; London Stansted; London Luton; Manchester; Birmingham; Bristol.

#### 19th January 2024: Vertiport Design Proposal for Existing Aerodromes

The CAA launched a consultation on proposals for existing aerodromes that wish to accommodate VTOL aircraft. Because they anticipate that the initial eVTOL flights will take place from existing infrastructure, this consultation only applies to existing aerodromes and not bespoke vertiports. # **Parliamentary Questions:**

Q.1. Question (7994) asked by Julian Knight (Solihull) on 5 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether he has made an assessment of the potential merits of the proposals for a third runway at Heathrow Airport for the West Midlands region".

A. Anthony Browne on 12 January 2024 "No recent assessment has been made of the merits of a third runway at Heathrow Airport for the regions. Heathrow expansion remains a private sector project and it is for the scheme promoter to decide when it submits a development consent order as part of the statutory planning process".

Q.2. Question (7799) asked by Gregory Campbell (East Londonderry) on 5 January 2024: "To ask the Chancellor of the Exchequer if he will make an assessment of the potential impact of rules on duty-free shopping on demand for flights (a) to and (b) from EU destinations at airports in (i) Northern Ireland and (ii) the rest of the UK".

A. Nigel Huddleston on 10 January 2024: "The Government remains committed to supporting the travel and tourism industries. As part of our support for the aviation industry, the Government regularly reviews flight data and considers it as part of policy making. From 1st January 2021, British passengers travelling to EU countries have been able to take advantage of duty-free shopping, bringing our approach to the EU in line with the rest of the world. Inbound personal allowances were also substantially increased. The Government keeps all taxes under review as part of the tax policy making cycle and Budget process".

Q.3. Question (9954) asked by Scott Benton (Blackpool South) on 16 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what capital funding his Department is making available to support the development of infrastructure at regional airports".

A. Anthony Browne on 23 January 2024: "Most airport operators are either in the commercial private sector or are public/private partnerships which operate commercially. As such, it is for airport owners to develop and fund proposals on the future development of airports. Airports may consider engaging with local authorities who are best placed to consider local transport priorities using the funding courses at their disposal."

Q.4. Question (9953) asked by Scott Benton (Blackpool South) on 16 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what support he is providing to regional airports for the costs of installing infrastructure to allow a transition to green fuel sources".

A. Anthony Browne on 23 January 2024: "As a predominately private sector investment in infrastructure is a matter for individual airports. The Government is however supporting R&D activity to enable the sector to prepare for the adoption of new zero emission aviation fuels such as hydrogen. As part of the Tees-Valley Transport Hydrogen Hub DfT is supporting the establishment of re-fuelling stations at Teesside International Airport which can be used by hydrogen airside vehicles.

In October 2023 DfT launched a Transport Research and Innovation Grant competition. Through this we are offering funding for up to 10 projects which can facilitate the development of infrastructure for zero emission airport operations and the handling of zero emission aircraft. The competition has closed and applications are currently being assessed.

In addition, the Jet Zero Council has a dedicated sub-group on Zero Emission Flight Infrastructure. This group convenes representatives of government, industry and academia with an interest in developing zero emission flight in the UK".

Q.5. Question (HL1646) asked by Lord Jackson of Peterborough on 16 January 2024: "To ask His Majesty's Government what consideration, if any, they have given to introducing a temporary suspension of Air Passenger Duty to support the competitive position of UK airports".

A. Baroness Vere of Norbiton on 25 January 2024: "As with all taxes, the Government keeps Air Passenger Duty (APD) under review and any changes are announced by the Chancellor at fiscal events. APD applies to airlines and is the principal tax on the aviation sector since tickets are VAT free and aviation fuel incurs no duty. It is expected to raise £3.8 billion in 2023-24 and the primary objective of the tax is to ensure that airlines make a fair contribution to the public finances. From April 2023, the Government has reduced the rate of APD on domestic flights in order to support UK-wide connectivity. The new domestic rate applies to all flights between airports in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland (excluding private jets) and is set at £6.50 for economy passengers, benefitting more than 10 million passengers in 2023-24".

Q.6. Question (HL1645) asked by Lord Jackson of Peterborough on 16 January 2024: "To ask His Majesty's Government what discussions they have had with the Manchester Airports Group regarding its ambition to develop new long-haul airline routes from Stansted airport as a means of driving growth in the region".

A. Lord Davies of Gower on 29 January 2024: "Ministers and officials regularly meet with Manchester Airports Group (MAG) to discuss a range of issues. Where opportunities for new commercial flights exist, airports and other stakeholders can work together to establish the case for commercial flights and work with airline partners to create new connections for their communities".

- Q.7. Question (HL1644) asked by Lord Jackson of Peterborough on 16 January 2024: "To ask His Majesty's Government what discussions they have had with (1) train operating companies, and (2) other stakeholders, on improving rail services to Stansted airport".

  A. Lord Davies of Gower on 30 January 2024: "Officials meet regularly with the owners of Stansted Airport, Manchester Airport Group, and attend the annual Stansted Airport Surface Access Forum, along with other stakeholders. Officials also engage regularly with Greater Anglia and CrossCountry about Stansted Airport services. As a result, off-peak and weekend Stansted Express services doubled from December 2023 to give a 15-minute frequency to London. The aspiration for full hourly CrossCountry services from Birmingham to Stansted Airport should be met when resources allow".
- Q.8. Question (10404) asked by Gregory Campbell (East Londonderry) on 18 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether he has made an assessment of the implications for his policies of the decision by BA to increase the minimum connection time at Heathrow Airport to 75 minutes".

A. Anthony Browne on 23 January 2024: "The Government continues to work with ground handlers, airlines and airports to ensure they are doing all they can to minimise disruption

for passengers. The aviation industry operates in the private sector therefore it is the responsibility of the sector to determine their operational plans".

# Q.9. Question (11307) asked by Henry Smith (Crawley) on 24 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, if his Department will review the position of sustainable aviation fuel within the waste hierarchy".

A. Robbie Moore on 31 January 2024: "The best environmental outcome for waste that cannot be either prevented or prepared for reuse is for material to be recycled. However, we know that that is not always possible. Where waste cannot be reused or recycled, the Government supports maximising the value of residual waste through recovering energy, including supplying electricity or heat, or through use as a fuel.

The process of converting waste into fuels is an energy recovery operation for the purposes of the waste hierarchy. We do not consider it the role of the waste hierarchy to determine the priority of recovery processes through which residual waste should be managed. There is nothing preventing the production of fuel from residual waste if this is determined to be the best overall value for money and environmental outcome for non-recyclable wastes. We therefore have no plans to change the position of sustainable aviation fuel within the waste hierarchy".

# Q.10. Question (10858) asked by Louise Haigh (Sheffield Heeley) on 22 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what progress his Department has made towards its aim of having at least five sustainable aviation fuel plants in production by 2025".

A. Anthony Browne on 25 January 2024: "Government and industry have a shared ambition to see at least five sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) plants under construction by 2025. There are currently two commercial-scale SAF plants operational or under construction in the UK, Phillips66 and Kew. We are supporting the development of the industry by driving demand through a SAF mandate which will be introduced in 2025, requiring at least 10% of jet fuel to be from sustainable sources by 2030. Government has awarded 13 potential SAF projects a share of £135m through the Advanced Fuels Fund (AFF), to support them to reach commercial scale. Government has also committed to consult on a revenue certainty mechanism to further support the industry".

Q.11. Question (10857) asked by Louise Haigh (Sheffield Heeley) on 22 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, with reference to his Department's press release entitled New measures to support sustainable aviation fuel industry, published 4 September 2023, how many commercial sustainable aviation fuel plants are under construction".

A. Anthony Browne on 25 January 2024: "There are currently two commercial-scale sustainable aviation fuel (SAF) plants operational or under construction in the UK. The Government's Advanced Fuels Fund has allocated £135m across 13 projects to support private investment in UK SAF projects by overcoming perceived technological and construction risks and will support our industry shared aim to have at least five commercial SAF plants under construction in the UK by 2025".

Q.12. Question (10856) asked by Louise Haigh (Sheffield Heeley) on 22 January 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, when his Department plans to publish a formal

response to the Pathway to net zero aviation: Developing the UK sustainable aviation fuel mandate consultation".

A. Anthony Browne on 25 January 2024: "Following the close of the consultation in September 2023, the department has made significant progress in updating the evidence base and finalising the design of the Mandate. I can confirm that the government response will be published in spring 2024".
