Editorial

March '24 was a busy month:

First, the DfT issued its 'National Networks' National Policy Statement for affirmative resolution by Parliament. Ports and airports are notable by their absence from the document – there is not even an overt cross-reference to other policy statements - a raising question marks over whether the Government considers the UK's principal international gateways to be a 'network', and if not, how it would then describe the country's port and airport ecosystems and what this means in policy terms. Is the inference that they have a different status (i.e. they are not considered 'core' transport infrastructure in the way that roads and railways are) and therefore are not eligible for Government support in the same way? This is something SASIG will be raising with DfT and report back on.

Second in the Chancellors' 6 March Budget it was revealed that APD for non-economy (i.e.. First Class, Business and Premium Economy) seats on flights to Band B mid-haul (2,000-5,500 miles) and Band C long-haul flights (over 5,500 miles) destinations from UK airports are to be increased from April 2025.

Third, the CAA announced Heathrow charges could be cut by 6% and that their figures show just 64% of UK flights departed/arrived within 15 minutes of the scheduled time in 2023.

Fourth, it was announced that London Southend was to be taken over by US private equity giant Carlyle and that City of Doncaster, have acquired a 125-year lease to take over the airport which had been signed. SASIG's Policy Director has been advising the Council since the airport was closed in October 2022.

Finally, speculation continues about whether Heathrow will again bring forward proposals for a third runway but in response to a Parliamentary question (No: 16729) the Aviation Minister confirmed that the Department had received no recent representations from Heathrow Airport Ltd on proposals to increase the number of air transport movements at the airport.

At the SASIG online meeting held on 19 March, night flights and airports slots consultations were discussed, and the Chairman gave an update on the progress of SASIG's Drone Bureau.

4 December 2023: Airport Slots:

The DfT launched a consultation seeking views on the proposals for reform that will apply to slot allocation at Level 3 slot coordinated airports.

Level 3 airports in the UK are:

London Heathrow; London Gatwick; London City; London Stansted; London Luton; Manchester; Birmingham; Bristol.

19th January 2024: Vertiport Design Proposal for Existing Aerodromes

The CAA launched a consultation on proposals for existing aerodromes that wish to accommodate VTOL aircraft. Because they anticipate that the initial eVTOL flights will take place from existing infrastructure, this consultation only applies to existing aerodromes and not bespoke vertiports. The CAA are inviting stakeholders to provide views and responses are requested by 2 April 2024.

22 February 2024: DfT consultation on the next night flight regime at the noise-designated airports (Heathrow, Gatwick, and Stansted).

This is for the night flight regime to commence in October 2025, when the current regime expires.

Parliamentary and Government News

Parliamentary Questions:

Q.1. Question (HL3040) asked by Baroness Randerson on 5 March 2024: "To ask His Majesty's Government what assessment they have made of the impact on tourism-related businesses of recent significant increases in fees charged by some airports for vehicles to drop off passengers, and what recent discussions they have had with representatives of the aviation industry about the transparency of the overall structure of their fees and charges".

A. Lord Davies of Gower on 15 March 2024: "Most airports in the UK are managed and operated as private businesses, and parking arrangements are subject to contractual agreements between airport operators and car parking companies covered by consumer laws. While the Department for Transport regularly engages with airports and airport operators on a range of issues, the provision and charging of car parking at airports (including drop off and pick charges) is a matter for the airport operator as a commercial business to manage and justify and therefore no assessment has been made on any impact on fees charged by airports for vehicles to drop off passengers. However, the Department expects car parking and drop off charges at airports to be managed appropriately and consumers treated fairly".

Q.2. Question (16729) asked by Ruth Cadbury (Brentford & Isleworth) on 4 March 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether his Department has received any representations from Heathrow Airport Ltd on proposals to increase the number of air transport movements at that Airport".

A. Anthony Browne on 11 March 2024: "The Department has received no recent representations from Heathrow Airport Ltd on proposals to increase the number of air transport movements at Heathrow Airport".

Q.3. Question (17164) asked by Louise Haigh (Sheffield, Heeley) on 5 March 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, with reference to page 73 of the Autumn Budget and Spending Review 2021, which policy areas will receive funding from the £1.8 billion allocated to core net zero spend relating to the Department for Transport for the 2024-25 financial year; and how much funding as been issued to each of those policy areas for the 2024-25 financial year".

A. Anthony Browne on 11 March 2024: "The £1.8 billion allocated to the Department for Transport for the financial year 2024-25 in the 2021 Spending Review supports net zero policies across zero emission vehicles (including buses) and electric vehicle charging infrastructure, the bus transformation funding to support local authority Bus Service Improvement Plans, air quality improvement measures, active travel policies, City Region Sustainable Transport Settlements, Nexus Metrofleet in Newcastle, rail electrification, and the UK's production of sustainable aviation fuel.

£333 million of the £1.8 billion was reallocated to the Department for Business, Energy, and Industrial Strategy, (now the Department for Business and Trade), for the electrification of UK vehicle manufacturing and their supply chains, including through the Automotive Transformation Fund Programme.

The Department's business planning process for 2024-25 financial year remains ongoing and final plans will be published in due course as per standard practice".

Q.4. Question (17361) asked by Steven Doughty (Cardiff South & Penarth) on 6 March 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what steps he is taking to ensure compliance with UK sanction regimes at (a) airports, (b) seaports and (c) rail entry points". A. Anthony Browne on 11 March 2024: "Transport sanctions apply to all UK ports and airports. His Majesty's Revenue and Customs lead on the enforcement of trade sanctions at rail entry points. At all ports, airports and rail entry points, there are clear processes in place to effectively identify and deal with sanctions breaches".

Q.5. Question (17380) asked by Tahir Ali (Birmingham, Hall Green) on 6 March 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what steps his Department is taking to help increase safety at regional airports".

A. Anthony Browne on 12 March 2024: "Most airport operators are either in the commercial private sector or are public/private partnerships which operate commercially. As such, it is for airports to ensure they adhere to regulations and standards relating to safety and security. The Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) issues either an aerodrome licence or aerodrome certificate to regional aerodromes on the basis that the aerodrome, and its operation, meets the licencing/certification criteria. The CAA establishes an oversight programme for each licensed/certificated aerodrome in which the continued compliance with the regulatory requirements is verified. Additionally, the aerodrome operator is required to have a safety management system, the effectiveness of which falls within the scope of the CAA oversight Programme. These UK regulations are developed and implemented to adhere to and go beyond the minimum international safety Standards and Recommended Practices (SARPs) set by the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO)".

Q.6. Question (18696) asked by Henry Smith (Crawley) on 14 March 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, whether the review of slots policy will clarify the exemption for non-use of slots for reasons outside the control of the carrier".

A. Anthony Browne on 21 March 2024: "We published the airport slot reform consultation on 4 December 2023 putting forward options for longer term reform of the slot system, including powers to provide alleviation from slot rules in exceptional circumstances. The consultation closed on 8 March. We are considering responses and will set out next steps in due course. In addition, a permanent expansion of justified non-utilisation provisions to include pandemics and other health crisis is being taken forward separately using powers in the Retained EU Law (Revocation and Reform) Act 2023".

Q.7. Question (18447) asked by Jim Shannon (Strangford) on 13 March 2024: "To ask the Secretary of State for Transport, what recent discussions he has had with representatives of Heathrow Airport on expansion of the airport".

A. Anthony Browne on 20 March 2024: "The Secretary of State has had no recent discussion with Heathrow Airport Ltd on proposals to expand the airport".
